Crosserlough Parish Guidelines to Re-Opening of the Churches for Mass

Church opening times for weekend masses as follows -

♦ St. Joseph's Church Drumkilly closed Saturdays from 5 to -7.30 pm Mass at 8 pm Saturday evenings

St. Mary's Church Crosserlough - 9.30 am Mass at 10 am Sunday mornings

St. Patrick's Church Kilnaleck - 10.45 am Mass at 11.15 am Sunday mornings

One Way System - The 3 churches will operate a one way system by parishioners coming in one door and exiting by another door (side or back door)

Sanitise - On entry to the church please use sanitisers provided outside the door

Face Masks - are Optional

Offertory Collection - A box will be in the porch to put your envelope/s in on entry to the church. We thank you all for your continued support during lockdown.

Seating Area - Please observe markings on seats (ushers will be there to help)

Mass Leaflets - Will be in the church porch, please take home all leaflets after use.

Altar Servers - There will be <u>no</u> altar servers at this time - this is to limit physical contact around the altar.

Eucharistic Ministers - will sanitise visibly at the front of the altar

Holy Communion - After the final prayer, holy communion will be distributed at the altar for those who wish to receive—please use both hands (in cup form) when receiving. This is in the interest of celebrant, parishioner and minister.

Exit the Church - Immediately after receiving communion parishioners will exit the church via the opposite door (on way system)

Social Distancing - Please observe social distancing when in the church by adhering to the markings set out.

Ushers - The ushers will be inside the church to guide you, please follow their direction. This is the new normal for now. All these guidelines are in the interest of everyone's safety. We welcome you all back to the church and hope that you will continue to keep safe and well.

Sanitising - All seats in the church will be sprayed and sanitised immediately after mass

Before the arrival of St. Patrick 21st June was a big pagan festival and it was celebrated in style in our county because the second shrine of significance in all of Ireland was at Magh Sleacht which means the plain of prostrations and was in the parish of Templeport. At this time our pagan forefathers assumed the gods to be revealed in the sun. moon and stars, and the anger of these gods successfully manifested in thunder and lightning and this god. The god of thunder was Crom Cruadh and the celebration began on the summer solstice June 21st coming to a high point in the first days of August (Lughnasa) Unfortunately for some human sacrifices were offered to Crom. Adults and children. When St. Patrick had broken the power of the @Druids@ at Tara the principal pagan shrine he destroyed the shrine of Crom putting on end to the barbaric practice of human sacrifice.
