The importance of a good beginning.

A key element of the Christian message is that life is not the way it was meant to be. It is broken in all sorts of ways. Your life and mine are fraught with human limitations and so we need to become aware of the realities of sickness deafness and blindness the captive, and the poor. As part of the religious formation of the children in primary school we try to help them understand that the burdens of life, can be eased if we work as a united group, no matter how small that help can be offered and no matter who is helped by the generosity. Schools with a religious ethos exist in all countries exist in almost all countries except those where they are outlawed by nondemocratic regions. In many nations as in Ireland they form a central part of the education system, while in almost all democratic societies they are funded by the state. Such school's provided a real public service and they are a notable expression of the contribution of the voluntary sector to the development of a vibrant civil society. At the core of this development of the promotion education for the masses was the desire of the early church to spread the teaching of Jesus and the hope that the traditions handed on by Jesus would become a permanent tradition.
