Slave becomes Liberator

For many years Dublin was a hub in the slave trade where people from all over Europe would come to buy slaves. It is believed that St. Patrick was one of those slaves having been captured in Wales. His father had been a civil servant in the Roman army holding a position called a "Patrician" which is the origin of St. Patrick's name. So the story goes that he spent a number of years in the mountains of Antrim herding sheep which formed his character and prepared him for something great. This something was never seen before, a Christian culture where slavery and human sacrifice became unthinkable and warfare though impossible for humans to eradicate, diminished markedly. What Patrick had learned on "Sliabh Mish" will never be known but something empowered Patrick to achieve a bloodless revolution in converting Ireland to Christianity.
