The Grieving Process – Meant for Ascension.

The grieving process begins when the person draws their last breath. This is normally a time of relief for the family as they have been under a lot of stress during the final days. This stress is relieved when the family members inform the extended family of the death. This stress is further relieved when neighbours hear of the death and they flood the house of the deceased bringing practical help in the shape of food. The process of grieving has begun in earnest as waves of outsiders arrive, many unknown to the immediate family. They introduce themselves and then follow up with stories about the deceased, which invariably create a larger, than life image of the deceased. So, people who have lots of energy will stay "awake" for the whole night and maybe a second night "awake". This form of support is of huge benefit to the family. The process is now shifted to the passing through the door of the house for the last time, to pass through the church door for the celebration of the funeral mass. The mass will highlight the death and resurrection of Jesus from the dead, and this is made available to the deceased, which offers consolation to the family and extended family. The finality of death is highlighted as the coffin is lowered into the grave as the priest proclaims "dust thou art and to dust you shall return". The family are now exhausted and fragile. To ease the burden, the tradition of the month's memory mass creates a space for grieving alone, to allow the frayed edges to be restored which is the benefit of having time to reflect. Between the months memory mass and the 1st anniversary mass the grieving process ought not be disturbed so that the family can enter into the space of resting in peace. 'May they Rest in Peace'
