The Rosary an all enduring Prayer

The Rosary became a popular part of the Catholic faith (1200 AD). In a world where the printing press had not been invented and people were unable to read or write, the Rosary became widespread because it was so accessible and it could be said in all social occasions and religions and by all sorts of people who could not read in public. The focus of the Rosary was meditating on the principal movements of Jesus life. A common way of praying the Rosary is to start with the crucifix and contemplate the creed then our Father, a hail Mary on the three small beads and follow the pattern right through. The undercurrent of saying the Rosary, is that the mind is relaxed. The anxiety we had is dissolved. In a way the Rosary is a form of therapy, as you are aware of the fact of trying to fall a sleep you start the Rosary you fall asleep and next morning you cannot remember which decade you fell asleep. One of the interesting facts about the Rosary is that it lasted for 1000 years with undergoing some change. There may have been people who thought that there should have been alternative mysteries. But some years ago John Paul the 2nd. introduced new areas of contemplation to expand the number of topics that people could contemplate.
